Establishing a Legacy of "Making the Impossible Possible" through Faith and Good Works

Bishop (Dr.) Sedgwick Daniels was known to many, in many different roles — so many that we may never fully comprehend the lasting impact he has had on the world around him.

Bishop Daniels, who transitioned to glory on November 12, was a man of complete faith. Guided by family virtues that produced in him a tireless commitment to making life better for others, he was, in the most meaningful way, God's definitive servant leader.

Daniels was that rare combination of intellect, spirituality and enterprise which resulted in an incredible list of accomplishments, all designed to help his fellow man.

Blessed with the common touch as well, he made genuine connections with those with whom he came in touch, befriended, guided, counseled, and loved during 40 years of saintly stewardship.

People were often struck by Bishop Daniels' loving spirit and faithful commitment.

Bishop leaned heavily on his foundational belief in the ability to change people's hopes and ultimately, their lives.

To do so, he often said, "You must not just repeat scripture, you must address the real and present needs of the whole community by taking action and doing what scripture commands — serve."

Bishop Sedgwick Daniels was

called to set out upon his sanctified life of service 37 years ago when he established the Holy Redeemer Institutional Church of God in Christ with only eight members.

Over time, Holy Redeemer grew to become one of the largest congregations in the Church of God in Christ (COGIC) denomination with over 8,000 members and more than 40 impactful internal ministries and transformational external partnerships.

These transformative ministries have positively impacted the lives of people in many communities, in everything from affordable housing to employment to health care to food security to banking services.

From the very beginning, Bishop Daniels focused on his commitment to the belief that there is "nothing too hard for

Profiles of Milwaukee's NEW History Makers and Pioneers

Traditionally, SOS means a call or request for help or rescue, but in Milwaukee the SOS Center is an acronym for Strength of Savior.

And, rather than requesting help or rescue, the SOS Center offers youth both as part of its after school initiative.

What's more it's free! Located at 4620 W. North Avenue, the SOS Center is a non-profit social services agency that was founded by Ken

and Arlene Greves in 1982.

The organization facilitates Christian care, provides educational instruction, and offers after school programming and life skills activities for children and families in the Milwaukee community.

Lydia Beasley, a staunch supporter, volunteer, and cheerleader for the SOS Center, first became involved with the Center in 2015.

"I'm an accountant and when a friend, Johnnie Fields, told me that SOS Center needed a treasurer, my somewhat flippant response was, 'Good luck. I hope you find one.' Sometimes when you are anointed to do something, people don't argue with

you, so I was encouraged to just attend one board meeting, which I did. "I found it to be an encouraging space, so I started out as a treasurer, then I got involved with the after school program," said Beasley. Now "all in," Beasley can't say enough good things about the Center's afterschool program and Saturday activities for youth. The after school activities are mostly geared to youth 7 to 12

years old (i.e., first grade through seventh grade), but the Saturday activities are geared to older youth.

The afterschool program is open Monday through Thursday from 3 to 6 p.m., and Saturday activities are from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

"On Saturdays, we have a range of activities from playing chess, to sewing and baking, and arts and crafts activities. We purposely have open activities so youth can explore new and different things.

We will soon have a media room computer hub, so parents who bring their children can work on computers, while they wait for them," said Beasley.

During the summer, the SOS

This inscription was amplified in his messages, seen above the pulpit, in educational facilities, and engraved in the hearts of anyone who stepped foot on the Holy Redeemer campus. Bishop knew that in order for people to advance, faith must be converted into action in a demonstrable way that addressed the challenges in their everyday lives.

From the outset, his ministry prioritized understanding people with authenticity, and connecting in relevant ways. Bishop Daniels recognized the importance of making clear connections with people, with humility and grace – whether a corporate CEO or a single parent, with all receiving the same level of spiritual guidance and support.

His unique ministry, exceptional leadership, and beloved personality resonated with the entire community. No one can attend service at Holy Redeemer and not catch the Holy Redeemer “fever.” Infectious joy and visible improvement are ever-present in service to the community through established Holy Redeemer ministries campus-wide. The day that the doors of the Mother Kathryn Daniels Youth Center opened, 20 years ago, with literally thousands gathered to celebrate, signaled a significance milestone in reinforcing hope, creating opportunity, and building resource within the heart of Mil-



waukee. Key local and national leaders of influence and impact attended together, excited to see transformational improvement for the community. That distinguished group included Hall of Famer Michael Jordan, who made the first shot in the Daniels Youth Center gymnasium. Amidst the names known and unknown, a reminder of the significance and value of the occasion, was the memory of Bishop Daniels and Michael Jordan embracing a young man confined to a wheelchair for life who had come to celebrate with the same joyful anticipation of a better life which campus growth represented. Holy Redeemer’s capacity and commitment to serve grew vigorously through the establishment

of more than 40 ministries designed to address all aspects and stages of a person's life. Bishop formed the HR Housing Corporation to address housing needs for the elderly, resulting in the development of hundreds of residential units. He formed a credit union and built a youth center in the most densely populated and under-

served area in Milwaukee. In this capacity, he worked with people of many cultures and denominations who shared his commitment to community service.

Bishop became the first non-Catholic to be appointed to the Milwaukee interdenominational leadership group in Wisconsin, where he operated ecumenically knowing that collaboration is the key to building community. His cooperative spirit included frequent engagement with clergy in the state, region, and around the country. His friends of other denominations enjoyed referring to him as the “Penta-Baptist.” Noted pastor and social Justice activist, Jamal Bryant, shared with his followers across the country that, “In Bishop Daniels, America has lost a remarkable religious leader and visionary, but we know that his vision will continue.” Daniels’ ministry grew amazingly over the years prior to his 2002 appointment to the office of Bishop and Jurisdictional Prelate for Wisconsin First Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction for the Churches of God in Christ, and continuing thereafter. He stepped into that role with strongly rooted values instilled since childhood, recognizing the

imperative of honoring those who come before you and build you up.

To quote him precisely from that day, “April 15 is for me, middle ground—middle ground, the place between the cherubim, the mercy seat, and the dwelling place of God. This day, and from this place, I salute my parents from the oasis of middle ground.”

Bishop led with honor, demonstrating service, and offering guidance to more than 100 churches in Minnesota, Michigan, Illinois and Wisconsin, congregations supporting families and building stronger communities.

Significantly, his commitment to combining faith and good works was adopted jurisdictionally and those who followed honored his example through action.

Bishop Charles E. Blake, then Presiding Bishop of the Church of God in Christ remarked, “Bishop Daniels was one of those true vi-

sionaries who understood that God's power enables us to do truly remarkable things.

Everything that his hand touched, whether at the national church, the jurisdiction, or the local church, was transformed. Literally, millions of people have been affected by that spirit.

His legacy, we know, will continue.” As a result of this vision and demonstrated good works, Bishop Daniels was elevated to National Secretary to the General Board and later, Interim Second Assistant Presiding Bishop of the Church of God in Christ for the more than six million COGIC members in the United States and around the globe.

His efforts to ensure that faith and good works produced tangible results is evidenced throughout his lifetime at all levels.

This elevation brought to bear the meaning of responsibility and duty to others. The increase represented his personal commitment to outreach.

His spirit of service was inspired by his saintly Mother, Mother Kathryn Daniels, who taught him to “first take care of home.” As a thought leader, he was called upon to serve in many influential roles.

He was a quiet advisor to public and private leaders at the highest levels including presidents, governors, mayors, and other civic leaders, yet he always reserved time to invest locally, serving actively on fifteen boards including the Boys and Girls Clubs of Milwaukee and V&J Holding Companies, Inc. His sought-after advice generated numerous community collaborations, bringing together the



best aspects of all people involved. Bishop had a long history of concern and philanthropic involvement on an international scale as well.

Along with sister Valerie, he supported multiple initiatives in Africa and helped build wells, orphanages, and churches across the continent - as far west as Ghana and as



far east as Kenya. Bishop was invited to the Middle East where he spent time with religious leaders of different faiths, participating in an Abrahamic roundtable for greater cooperation between the faiths, demonstrating his belief that

“Faith is universal!” Legendary businessman, Calvin “Cal” Darden shared, “It was phenomenal and inspiring to meet a minister who could take resources and expand them to change the very lives of people and build institutions where others thought it was not possible. We are all so very fortunate that Bishop Daniels came our way. He created an everlasting legacy of change.”

Bishop’s advocacy for change was inherited. His grandfather, Reverend G.T. Townsel, who was saluted at the national civil rights museum, was an advocate for social justice in Birmingham, Alabama, during the most difficult times of the civil rights move-

ment led by a young, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. In his early ministry, Bishop Daniels was called upon by more senior members of the clergy in Wisconsin to advance social jus-

(continued from front page) Center also offers vacation bible school, but they do it differently than most churches.

“We have a five-week vacation Bible School, and we are thinking of expanding it to six weeks this year.

“We partner with other churches, so they each take turns coming in with Bible Study and activities. This past summer 60 youth participated in our program, which runs from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

“We provide breakfast, lunch and snacks. We also participate in the City of Milwaukee’s Earn & Learn program, so youth workers and volunteers help us with the children,” said Beasley.

Beasley has truly found her calling, working with youth in the SOS Center, and she is committed to expanding it and encouraging others to get involved.

“One of my goals is to provide youth with life skills so they can use their skillset to earn money;



maybe even turn it into a side hustle or a business and save money for college.

“I believe in the potential of kids. I also want to leave space for others to take over these programs.

“I try to put the younger people in leadership roles because I know there is a lot they can do. We are in a state of emergency with our youth, especially black youth.

“I want them to know that there is nothing they cannot do. There are people out there who care, love them, and believe in them.

“We have gems. We have little diamonds all throughout our community. We just need to dust them off and watch them shine,” said Beasley.

DON'T LET ANYONE FOOL YOU: THE FDA ACTION ON MENTHOL WILL SAVE BLACK LIVES

The U.S. FDA recently issued a ruling on menthol cigarettes that prohibits the manufacture and sale of menthol cigarettes in the United States, an action research estimates found could **save up to 654,000 lives**, including more than **238,000 Black Lives** over the course of 40 years.

The ruling is a step towards righting the historic wrongs of the tobacco industry against African American communities, which it targeted for decades with its deadly menthol products. But, as also evidenced throughout history, the tobacco industry does not plan to go down without a fight. It's wielding its many resources to wage a campaign of misinformation related to the menthol ban, including that it will result in the "over policing of the Black community. In other words, "targeting."


It's downright shameless that an industry which still targets the Black community, is warning those same communities that they in fact, will be targeted when menthols are removed from the market. No one should ever mistake the tobacco industry as a trusted messenger.

The successful campaign they wielded to push menthols in Black communities resulted in tobacco being a major contributor to the three leading causes of death for African Americans: heart disease, cancer, and stroke, with 45,000 dying each year from smoking-related deaths.

The truth is, the FDA has said that it can't and won't enforce the ban against individuals who smoke or possess menthols. Saying the ban will result in over-policing is an example of the tobacco industry exploiting real issues in the community related to police brutality and mass incarceration. The fact of the matter is that the menthol ban will save countless lives, including those of our friends, loved ones, and future generations.

IN MEMORIAM: ROSALYNN CARTER

Reactions Pour in Following the Passing of Former First Lady and Global Humanitarian

In a wave of condolences, political leaders and public figures expressed their grief and admiration for the late Rosalynn Carter, former first lady to Jimmy Carter and tireless advocate for various social issues.

President Joe Biden, visibly moved, shared his sentiments with reporters as he boarded Air Force One in Norfolk, Virginia, on Sunday night.

Habitat For Humanity, the Georgia-based charity closely associated with the Carters, expressed sadness at the news.

The organization described Carter as a “compassionate and committed champion” who worked tirelessly to help families worldwide.

The late First Lady and her husband co-founded the Carter Center, which expressed its sorrow in a statement by highlighting their global initiatives to strengthen democracy, settle disputes, advance human rights, and eradicate crippling diseases.

The center announced that, instead of flowers, contributions in Carter’s memory could be made to the Carter Center’s Mental Health Program or the Rosalynn

Carter Institute for Caregivers. “He had this great integrity and still does. And she did too,” Biden remarked. “God bless them.” After speaking with the family, Biden learned that Jimmy Carter’s children and grandchildren were by his side during his final moments.

regarding police reform. He was an integral part of an inter-denominational group, and led thousands of people in Milwaukee in the campaign to ensure that the American justice system was fair and equitable.

His work did not stop with advocacy, though. Milwaukee Mayor John Norquist appointed Bishop to the City Planning Commission where he helped facilitate policy and initiate action to address the need for diversity and inclusion in keeping pace with industry and opportunity, and with a vision of a vibrant and attractive Milwaukee.

He worked and provided guidance on major economic projects as the city grew, while always maintaining his total commitment to the neighborhoods which comprise Milwaukee’s core. Bishop Daniels received numerous recognitions for his exceptional work, locally and nationally.

At an early age, he was recognized by the Greater Milwaukee Foundation for his impact on the community.

The Bishop was inducted into the Morehouse College Board of Preachers joining Reverends Otis Moss, Jr., Calvin Butts, Charles E. Blake, Senator Raphael Warnock, and Oprah Winfrey.

On the Official Day of Wisconsin First’s 104th Holy Convocation (Bishop Daniels’ 21st as Jurisdictional Prelate), Bishop received the prestigious Frederick Douglas Award from Mother AME Zion Church in New York, one of the most important churches in the world founded in 1796.

Rev. Dr. Malcolm J. Byrd, senior pastor of Mother AME Zion, cited Bishop’s character, humility, and continued dedication to community empowerment in presenting the award to Bishop.

Bishop Daniels’ commitment to meeting the needs of people through guidance was epitomized in every aspect of his work.

He was a massive champion for educational access for all people and developed partnerships with major healthcare entities and educational institutions including Marian University in Wisconsin.

Through his efforts, many Milwaukee residents have pursued and received their college degrees from Marian onsite at the campus of Holy Redeemer.

A member of Holy Redeemer, former Green Bay Packer and Senior Vice President for University Relations at Marian, Dr. George Koonce noted, “Bishop Daniels was a guiding force creating partnerships to enlarge and change people’s lives.

Both Marian University and the Milwaukee community have benefited tremendously from his efforts.

I am privileged, humbled, and honored to have known and worked closely with such a wonderful philanthropist and man of God.”

There are thousands of youngsters who, because of his guidance and love, have gone on to careers in music, business, medicine, and the arts.

He established the Institute for the Preservation of African-American Music and Arts, which houses thousands of artifacts in the most densely populated part

of Milwaukee.

A member of the board and internationally renowned opera singer and star of “Carmen Jones” in London’s West End, Paula Dione Ingram said, “I was amazed someone would bring this treasure to the heart of an impoverished community—he is to be saluted. His legacy is only now unfolding, and his message of faith and good works will continue without end.”

A testament to his work ethic molded by his Alabama Baptist and Wisconsin Pentecostal upbringing, Bishop “worked” up until his final Sunday and indeed created a compelling and lasting message of inspiration in his newly released book just a few days before his transition.

That book encourages its readers to a mission of faith and good works and is entitled “Storms That Change Our Lives, Standing Strong in the Midst.”

There are scores of stories about how Sedgwick Daniels transformed people’s lives. A favorite time of year on campus for Bishop was the entire Christmas season celebrating the birth of Christ and enjoying all that the Lord has provided.

Bishop personally delivered food and gave out thousands of gifts to those in the community each year who otherwise would not have been able to find joy during the holiday in the way he so much wanted every person and family to have.

While the media may have focused on reporting these larger-scale events, Bishop was personally more attentive to the countless other small things, like

Bill Maher: Tell Me You're a Racist Without Telling Me You're a Racist!

At what point do we stop calling him racially insensitive and call him what he is... a Racist. In full disclosure, I used to like some of his stuff, for the most part. That was until I heard his last monologue, in which he said the following:

Marginalized people are better because of Western ideals

That statement "Marginalized people are better off because of Western ideals," or in his case, white European men, can indeed be

considered offensive and racist, as it implies that the inherent worth or value of marginalized individuals is somehow tied to the influence of Western ideals (or white men).

Such a statement can perpetuate harmful stereotypes and undermine the experiences and struggles of marginalized communities.

Western societies have a complex history marked by colonization, imperialism, and the transatlantic slave trade, all of which have perpetuated

systemic racism and contributed to the marginalization of people of color. Furthermore, the legacy of Western philosophical, scientific, and political thought has been criticized for its historical context, which often promoted notions of racial superiority and the subjugation of non-Western cultures.

The Enlightenment era, for example, while marked by significant intellectual advancements, also saw the development of pseudoscientific racial theories that people continually use today to justify discriminatory practices.

Thinkers of the time promoted the idea of a racial hierarchy, with non-white races being considered inferior to the white race. These ideas permeated various aspects of Western thought, including anthropology, biology, and sociology, and were used to justify discriminatory practices and policies.

This racial superiority is one of the critical aspects underscoring the racist underpinnings of Western ideals. During the era of European colonization, ideologies of white supremacy were used to justify the subjugation

and exploitation of indigenous peoples in colonized territories. These ideologies were often intertwined with notions of cultural and intellectual superiority, leading to the systematic erasure of indigenous knowledge and traditions and the imposition of Western values on colonized populations.

The legacy of Western imperialism and colonialism has also had lasting effects on the global distribution of power and resources, creating a world order that continues to disadvantage countries and peoples that were formerly colonized or exploited. Economic exploitation and resource extraction from colonized regions have perpetuated cycles of poverty and underdevelopment, leading to ongoing socio-economic disparities that disproportionately affect people of color.

Furthermore, systemic racism remains prevalent in many Western societies today. Despite advancements in civil rights, discriminatory practices continue to persist in areas such as housing, employment, education, and the criminal justice system. Racial profiling, discriminatory legislation, and racial disparities in access to

opportunities have created a system that perpetuates inequality and reinforces the marginalization of minority communities.

It's also important to consider that the concept of "better" is subjective and can vary based on individual perspectives and is based on the values of white men.

While Western ideals may attempt to promote (as it did not invent) values such as democracy, individual freedoms, and human rights, countries like the United States have actively fought against democracies that did not promote their brand of Western ideologies via coup d'état and other forms of political and economic manipulation. In the 1960s, the US-backed coups overthrew the democratically elected governments of Brazil (1964), Argentina (1966), Peru (1968), and Bolivia (1969) and replaced them with a military government. Additionally, it continues to deny fundamental human rights, such as food or health care. During a vote in 2021 at the United Nations, the US and Israel were the only two (2) countries to vote against food being a basic human right. Finally, the US

continues to participate in the denial of freedoms to millions of black and brown people through over-policing, policies, and practices such as redlining, as well as other various forms of "marginalization."

So yes, Bill, you are a racist. Marginalized people only became marginalized because of Western ideals, and your idea of "better" is rooted in white male Euro-centric thought, which drops you right into the middle of some white nationalist thought patterns.

For us (meaning everyone) to continue to improve globally as a people, that continued growth towards a "better" society will only occur once Western ideals morph into a more inclusive global model, which will only happen when those ideals are challenged and changed by influences from everyone from around the world (i.e., non-Western ideals).
